### GENERAL

- COMPLETE MANUAL OF CRIMINAL FORMS FEDERAL AND STATE, by *F. Lee Bailey and Henry B. Rothblatt*. Rochester: The Lawyers Co-operative Publishing Company, 1968. Pp. lix, 835. Cloth: \$35.00. Subject: Brings together the most commonly used forms in the practice of criminal law. Both state and federal examples are included and, if used imaginatively, almost every type of criminal motion or order can be prepared by employing these practice models as guides.
- COUNSEL ON APPEAL, edited by *Arthur A. Charpentier*. New York: McGraw-Hill Book Company, 1968. Pp. xi, 223. Cloth: \$7.95. Subject: The appellate function is analyzed by these distinguished lawyers and jurists: Harris Steinberg, Simon Rifkind, Charles Breitell, Thurgood Marshall, Milton Pollack, Whitman Knapp, and Samuel Gates. A study of motivation and efforts, as appellate courts strive to resolve those enigmas which advocates seek to explain.
- DOLLARS, DELAY AND THE AUTOMOBILE VICTIM, studies supported by the *Walter E. Meyer Research Institute of Law*. New York: The Bobbs-Merrill Company, Inc., 1968. Pp. xvii, 486. Cloth: \$9.50. Subject: Twelve reports on the theoretical and practical facets of the interrelated problems of highway accidents and delayed justice.
- HOW TO AVOID PROBLEMS WITH YOUR WILL, by *Robert A. Farmer & Associates*. New York: Arco Publishing Company, Inc., 1968. Pp. vi, 106. Cloth: \$4.95. Subject: Explains in layman's language matters concerning the writing and execution of a will. Also described are the various laws regarding trusts, contracts, deeds, gifts, and other ways of minimizing or avoiding estate taxes and probate.
- JUDICIAL SELECTION AND TENURE, edited by *Glenn R. Winters*. Chicago: American Judicature Society, 1967. Pp. 196. Paper: \$2.00. Subject: A collection of current writings by distinguished public men as John V. Lindsay, Rogert J. Traynor and Tom C. Clark, discussing the methods of selecting and retaining judges. Emphasis is placed on reform and specifically on the combination nominative-appointive-elective plan now known as the merit plan.
- THE LAW AND THE LOW INCOME CONSUMER, SUPP. NO. 2, edited by *Carol Hecht Katz*. New York: New York University School of Law, 1968. Pp. ix, 417. Paper: Price unknown. Subject: This supplement is devoted to the legal problems of the low income consumer. The materials have been compiled to acquaint legal services attorneys with legal issues and actions that can be taken on behalf of their clients, rather than to recount in great detail the evils that confront the impoverished consumer.
- LAW IN A CHANGING AMERICA, edited by *Geoffrey C. Hazard, Jr.* Englewood Cliffs, New Jersey: Prentice-Hall, Inc., 1968. Pp. xiii, 207. Cloth: \$5.95. Subject: Hazard and thirteen experts analyze the problems facing the American legal profession

and point out ways to solve them. The rise of group legal service plans to aid not only the poor but also the middle and lower-middle income levels of society is predicted and the failure of the legal profession to take advantage of new technological advances and organizational procedures is pointed out.

MANUAL OF PUBLIC INTERNATIONAL LAW, *edited by Max Sorensen*. New York: St. Martin's Press, 1968. Pp. lxxv, 930. Cloth: \$12.50. Subject: A unique treatise on the nature, content, and functions of international law, considering its actual and potential usefulness in interstate relations and as the foundation of a peaceful international community.

1968 GUIDEBOOK TO LABOR RELATIONS. Chicago: Commerce Clearing House, Inc. Pp. 376. Paper: \$5.00. Subject: Fifteen chapters explaining the basic principles of labor law. Provided are clear-cut discussions of federal labor relations rules developed under the National Labor Relations Act, the Labor-Management Reporting and Disclosure Act and the Taft-Hartley Act.

THE POLITICS AND DYNAMICS OF HUMAN RIGHTS, *by Moses Moskowitz*. Dobbs Ferry, New York: Oceana Publications, Inc., 1968. Pp. xii, 283. Cloth: \$7.50. Subject: Deals with the momentous implications of the principle of international concern with human rights. The author believes that only the universal acceptance of human rights will bring us peace and a just and enduring world order.

POLITICAL PARTICIPATION, *Report of the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights*. Washington: U.S. Government Printing Office, 1968. Pp. viii, 256. Paper: 75 cents. Subject: Deals with political participation by Negroes since the passage of the Voting Rights Act of 1965. The Commission found that the Act has resulted in a great upsurge in voter registration and voting in the South but that new barriers to full and equal political participation, including measures or practices diluting the votes of Negroes, have arisen.

THE SUPREME COURT ON FREEDOM OF THE PRESS: DECISIONS AND DISSENTS, *by William A. Hachten*. Ames, Iowa: The Iowa State University Press, 1968. Pp. xxi, 316. Cloth: Price unknown. Subject: A collection of decisions of the Supreme Court relating to freedom of expression. The seventy excerpted decisions include such challenges to freedom of expression as those posed by censorship, libel, the right to privacy, postal controls and FCC controls over broadcasting.

THE TAX ON ACCUMULATED EARNINGS. Chicago: Commerce Clearing House, Inc., 1968. Pp. 128. Paper: \$3.00. Subject: The law of accumulated earnings is presented and such facets as tax computation, the role of intent, burden of proof and multiple corporations are explained.

#### CASEBOOKS AND TEXTBOOKS

LABOR RELATIONS LAW, CASES AND MATERIALS, FOURTH EDITION, *by Russell A. Smith, Leroy S. Merrifield and Theodore J. St. Antoine*. New York: The Bobbs-Merrill Company, Inc., 1968. Pp. xlvii, 1196. Cloth: \$17.50. Subject: Revising and restructuring, rather than merely updating, the previous edition, with attention focused on such new developments as the emerging body of federal law on the rights of individual employees and on the resurgence of union organizational efforts.

WATER LAW, PLANNING & POLICY, CASES AND MATERIALS, by *Joseph L. Sax*. New York: The Bobbs-Merrill Company, Inc., 1968. Pp. xxxii, 520. Cloth: Price unknown. Subject: Departs from the traditional casebook organized along doctrinal lines devoting considerable space and attention to providing a factual background for each problem and emphasizing contemporary issues in water resource management.
